22 September, from Kuring Gai Police Area Command

Police are investigating an armed robbery in Sydney's north west.

At Midnight (Friday 21 September 2018), police were called to a pizza store on Rohini Street, Turramurra, after staff were threatened by a man with a knife.

The man took an amount of cash from the till before fleeing the scene on foot.

No staff were injured.

A crime scene was established which was examined by forensic specialists.

The man has been described as Caucasian, about 20 years old, slim build, and 185-190cm tall. He was wearing a balaclava.

Detectives from Kuring-Gai Police Area Command are conducting inquiries into the incident.

It is not only adults who are affected by domestic violence.

Children who live in homes where domestic and family violence occurs are at risk of harm and actual injury.

Whether a child witnesses domestic and family violence, is in another room when an assault occurs, or attempts to intervene to protect their parent, the impact upon children exposed to violence in the home is serious.

Parents who stay in an abusive relationship with a perpetrator need to understand the significant impact of abuse and violence on their children. Children can be directly affected by being present or indirectly when they witness an assault occurring (pushing, hitting or twisting an arm); destroying property, seeing or hearing ongoing harassment and intimidation or witnessing the victim parent constantly crying from the trauma.

Some children are brave and try to stop the perpetrator and often get physically hurt themselves. Other children may react by copying the perpetrator and begin hitting the victim parent or their brothers and sisters.

18 September, from Western Australia Police Force: Early danger signs of fatigue include:

- wandering thoughts;
- missing a gear, road sign or exit;
- slowing unintentionally;
- braking too late

The driver in this video was a 69-year-old woman, travelling alone in the afternoon on Great Southern Highway at Murdong on Wednesday 12 September. She believes she fell asleep, but says she doesn't really know what happened, thinking it could possibly be medically related.

Katanning Police attended her crash and she was treated for minor injuries at Katanning Hospital. She has been interviewed and will not be facing any charges. However she will have to undergo a Fitness to Hold examination to prove she is able to hold a driver's licence.

The driver realises she was lucky to survive, and asked us to release her dash cam vision to warn other drivers of the dangers of fatigue.

HORNSBY

A man has been arrested after allegedly embezzling more than \$273,000 from a research company he worked for in the Hornsby area over an eight-year period. The 43-year-old man from Chipping Norton is facing 19 fraud charges dating between 2010 and this year. Police said he allegedly falsified records claiming he was paying people to complete market research. He allegedly embezzled those funds from the company. The man has been bailed and will appear at Hornsby Court on Wednesday, October 10.

NORTH TURRAMURRA

A man has been charged eight years after allegedly starting a bushfire at North Turramurra. Police said the 47-year-old man from Hornsby was facing two charges relating to a fire in the Ku-ring-gai Chase National Park on July 5, 2010. Police will allege forensic evidence has matched him to the scene. The man allegedly carried a sponge soaked with accelerant into the park and started the fire. Fire services were quick to act and put it out. The man has been bailed and will front Hornsby Court on Wednesday, October 10.

TURRAMURRA

A 28-year-old man from Constitution Hill, near Parramatta, allegedly assaulted two people on a train before turning on police who intercepted him at Turramurra railway station. The man assaulted two people and used threatening language toward another on a train between Chatswood and Gordon about midnight on Saturday night. Police arrested the man at Turramurra station shortly afterwards,

but not before he resisted arrest and allegedly assaulted an officer. He was due to front Hornsby Court yesterday.

HORNSBY

A learner driver who crashed into a bus shelter has been charged for refusing to provide a sufficient sample when breath tested after the crash on Sunday. The 20-year-old man from Hornsby was also driving unaccompanied when he collided with the bus shelter on the Pacific Highway near Pymble railway station shortly after 2am on Sunday. He will face Hornsby Court on Wednesday, October 3. There is a zero alcohol limit for drivers on a learner's permit in NSW.

HORNSBY Council and the State Government have reached an impasse trying to solve a pedestrian and traffic problem in Beecroft, leaving one frustrated parent at his wit's end.

Beecroft resident Michael Turner said he would love for his sons to ride to nearby Beecroft Public School but crossing Kirkham St was "impossible".

"It is not just bad, it is horrific. It is backed up a long way from Beecroft Rd at peak times," he said.

"I would love to ride a bike with my two boys but I tend to drive just because it is not safe."

Mr Turner said putting in a zebra crossing would help but the real issue was the intersection at Beecroft Rd and Kirkham St.

He said putting in lights at that intersection would fix the traffic problems and would also give children a safe place to cross.

"It does not matter what time of day it is, it is always a bad intersection," he said.

“Traffic comes over the M2 from Carlingford and people travel up Kirkham St. If they want to turn right on to Beecroft Rd they are left waiting forever.”

He said many school families avoid Kirkham St by taking long detours.

Hornsby Council and Roads and Maritime Services (RMS) have pointed the finger at each other to fix the problem.

“There are no current plans to install traffic lights at the intersection of Beecroft Rd and Kirkham St,” an RMS spokesman said.

The council said lights were the safest solution.

“Council has been lobbying the NSW Government for a signalised crossing at Kirkham and Beecroft for at least a decade with no success,” it said.

“Council has investigated the options for a pedestrian crossing or island, but has concluded that is not safe enough. It needs a signalised crossing.”

Increased bushfire risk for Ku-ring-gai [Edited] [Page 4]: Residents warned to
prepare for 'intense' summer**

THE head of the Ku-ring-gai Rural Fire Service is warning residents to be prepared ahead of what is expected to be an 'more intense' bushfire season than usual.

Nic Lyons is the Brigade Captain of the Ku-ring-gai RFS and his team have been hard at work over the last several weeks, as they prepare for a bushfire season which has arrived earlier than normal.

“The interesting thing is that the bushfire season has actually been brought forward this year, normally it starts the first of October and it has been set to the first of September,” Mr Lyons told the North Shore Times.

“Really that is a reflection of the fact that we have got really dry conditions and it has been dry for the last 12 months at least.”

Confronting suicide: Community hears of mental illness challenges [Page 20]

THE TWT creative precinct at St Leonards has hosted an event supporting world suicide prevention day to raise awareness of a problem that causes over 2,800 deaths in Australia a year.

The event was hosted by the Bridging Hope Charity Foundation together with Lifeline Research Foundation.

In support of Lifeline’s “Out of the Shadows” campaign, members of the community gathered to hear three guest speakers.

They included Dr Tim Sharp, aka 'Dr Happy', from The Happiness Institute on Psychology of Positivity, who said: "I have three degrees from 10 years of formal study of psychology and in all that time I didn't learn anything about happiness."

Paediatric psychologist Melody Qu talked about the importance of hope, saying: "People of all nationalities and all ages need hope.

"But you can't raise hope out of nothing. You need resources, you need something concrete."

Educator and photographer Paul McDonald said his work was focused on "collaboration and education, helping other people get their voices out there through art".

An American child predator who built a relationship with a 16-year-old Australian girl over Facebook and then enticed her to fly to Los Angeles so he could sexually abuse her has been sentenced to 35 years' jail in New York.

Sean Price, 40, from Queens, New York, began communicating with the girl in 2016 on Facebook, and in their daily messages he openly discussed the girl's young age and expressed his desire to have sex with her.

23 September, from NSW marine Rescue

Marine Rescue experts are on the water north of Sydney this weekend as part of a major capability exercise before the peak boating season begins.

The Search and Rescue Exercise (SAREX) on the Hawkesbury today and on Broken Bay tomorrow is designed to test agencies' marine search and rescue practices and coordination.

More than 50 Marine Rescue NSW volunteers and nine rescue vessels from the Broken Bay, Central Coast, Cottage Point, Hawkesbury, Norah Head, Terrey Hills and Tuggerah Lakes units are participating.

The event also involves personnel and assets from the Marine Area Command - NSW Police Force and Westpac Life Saver Helicopter.

Marine Rescue NSW Deputy Commissioner Dean Storey said the exercise would help ensure crews were at peak readiness before the October Long Weekend which marks the start of the peak boating season.

"Our volunteers will sharpen marine search and rescue skills and strengthen cooperation with other rescue agencies in what is a high-activity waterway," he said.

A fruit growing and packing business at the centre of the strawberry contamination scandal is owned by a convicted drug trafficker named in a confidential report on organised crime.

Donnybrook Berries, at Elimbah near Caboolture in the heart of strawberry country north of Brisbane, is owned by Pasquale "Pat" Cufari from Mildura, Victoria.

He was not at the family property on farmland, on the outskirts of Mildura, when Fairfax Media arrived. Two men came to the front of the home where a red Ferrari was parked in the drive.

23 September, from NSW Electoral Commission

New electoral funding laws commenced 1 July 2018.

The new laws include specific requirements for electoral participants and political donors – changes relate to:

- Disclosure – more frequent disclosure of donations including pre-election
- Registration of electoral participants
- Campaign finances – how political donations and electoral expenditure are managed
- Associated entities of parties, MPs, and Mayors and Local Government Councillors
- Senior office holders of parties
- Public funding for parties and candidates.

The new laws must be complied with.

It's believed they may be headed for Kurri Kurri or the Central Coast areas.

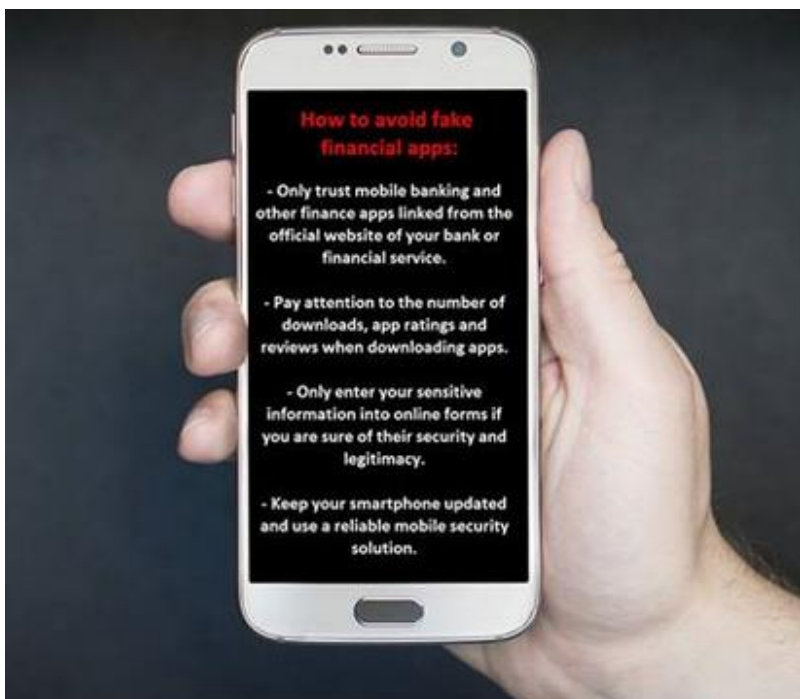
Police are warning members of the public not to approach the man, but instead call Triple Zero (000) immediately.

🦖 Beachgoers in NSW will have extra protection in the sky this summer, with the Government's collaborative drone trial program expanded to more NSW beaches.

In partnership with Surf Life Saving NSW, 15 beaches will have drones assisting lifeguards and lifesavers to spot any potential risks in the water as they happen.

This summer's collaborative trial will see drones at Main Beach Byron Bay, Lennox Head, Lighthouse Beach Ballina, Evans Head, Kingscliff, Yamba, Coffs Coast, Tacking Point Port Macquarie, Birubi, Redhead, Avoca, Kiama, Mollymook, Pambula and Tathra.

This incredible footage was captured during NSW DPI Fisheries aerial surveillance operations on the North Coast, and during drone research trips as part of the PhD collaboration between DPI and Southern Cross University. If you watch until the end, you'll see everything from a White Shark surfing a wave, to Tiger Sharks foraging on a whale carcass! 🦈🐋🦈
