17 August, from Crime Stoppers: MALE VICTIMS OF FAMILY VIOLENCE...



Male victims of family violence and abuse - like women - often face many barriers to disclosing their abuse:

- They are likely to be told that there must be something they did to provoke the perpetrator's abuse
- They can suffer shame, embarrassment and the social stigma of not being able to protect themselves
- They can fear that if they disclose the abuse there will be nowhere for them and their children to escape to
- In cases of intimate partner violence, they can fear that if they disclose the abuse or end the relationship, their partner might become more abusive and/or take the children
- They can feel uncertain about where to seek help, or how to seek help
- Services are less likely to ask whether a man is a victim of family violence, and when they do ask, they are less likely to believe him (indeed many health departments have mandatory domestic violence screening for young women, but no such screening for young men)

- Male victims can fear being falsely arrested and removed from their homes because of the assumption that because they are male, they must be a perpetrator and not a victim. When this happens, children can be left unprotected from the perpetrator of the violence, leading many men to suffer the abuse in silence in an attempt to protect their children.

Because of these barriers, men are much less likely to report being a victim of family violence than are women (and women also frequently don't report violence against them).

If you are a victim of family violence PLEASE contact police. You can call **triple zero (000) in an emergency**, your local police station. If you have information on family violence occurring to someone else you can report this to **Crime Stoppers 1800 333 000**.

17 August: NSW Police Force has joined Crime Stoppers Australia for Operation Roam 2015, to help track down wanted fugitives from across the country. Police will use Facebook and Twitter to seek information from the community about a number of alleged offenders who may have left their state or territory and are now residing interstate. This year, Crime Stoppers has compiled a list of 20 wanted people, including Brady Hamilton who is wanted over his alleged involvement in a homicide in western Sydney in 1999. Operation Roam is a nationwide campaign that promotes the exchange of information, regarding wanted people, between policing jurisdictions across Australia.

17 August: Police are investigating a fatal pedestrian crash in Gordon today.

About 7am (Monday 17 August 2015), a 71-year-old man was struck by a cement truck on the Pacific Highway. The man was taken to Royal North Shore Hospital where he was pronounced deceased. Police from the Metropolitan Crash Investigation Unit are examining the scene. The truck driver, a man aged in his 30s, will be taken to Royal North Shore Hospital for mandatory blood and urine tests. Any witnesses are urged to contact **Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000**.

16 August, from our neighbouring North Shore command: "P-plate driver charged with drink driving and having passengers in the boot – Lindfield"

North Shore Police were patrolling Roseville following a separate incident where they will allege they observed a Honda CRV on Shirely Road Roseville around 12:30am on Sunday 9th August. Police went to follow the vehicle and later located the car travelling along Westbourne Road Lindfield. Officers activated their warning lights and stopped the car. As the vehicle was stopped police observed a number of passengers who appeared to be under the age of 21, along with several passengers travelling in the boot area of the car unrestrained by a seatbelt.

Police spoke to the 17-year-old female driver who was subjected to a road side breath test. The test returned a positive result and the 17-year-old from Naremburn was arrested and taken to Chatswood Police Station for a breath analysis which returned a result of 0.065. She was charged with low range drink driving, drive motor vehicle with person in or on the boot and Not comply with P1 restrictions on passengers under 21, she will appear in Hornsby Local Court next month.

16 August, Police from North Shore Local Area Command are appealing to the public for information to help locate a missing 50-year-old man.

Colin David Campbell was last seen by his carer on Friday 29 May 2015, at a community care facility in Lane Cove. He was seen leaving the premises by other residents earlier that morning and has not been seen since. Police and relatives hold concerns for Colin's welfare as he is being treated for a long-term medical condition. After his disappearance was reported to police, extensive inquiries have been conducted into his phone and financial activities without success.



Colin is described as being of Caucasian appearance with a fair complexion, about 183cm tall, with a medium build and brown hair when last seen.

16 August, from CareFlight: Motorcyclist crashes into parked car in Castle Hill

A young motorcyclist has been taken to hospital in a serious condition after crashing into the rear of a parked car at Castle Hill this morning [15/8/15]. CareFlight's rapid response trauma team were called at 8.47am and landed minutes later in a car park opposite Bunnings, adjacent to the Victoria Avenue scene. The male motorcyclist, aged about 25, was initially unconscious. He was intubated and given a blood transfusion by the CareFlight doctor and paramedic. The medical team then continued treatment while the patient was being transported to Westmead Hospital in a road ambulance.

LYNDA SERVES 29 YEARS WITH THE FORCE

Story & photo by Cliff McK Gallagher of Mt Colah (A West In 2015 Women in the NSW Police Force are marking 100 years of service with celebrations across the State. In Hornsby Mall a display was set up on 15th July where women of the NSW Force mingled with locals. It was there that I met up with Senior Constable Lynda Hart who is stationed at Hornsby Police Station and has served a total of 29 years with 'The Force'.

"I was employed by the NSW Police Force as a Police Junior Trainee, as I was too young to join, and worked at Gosford Police Station (No 30 Division) from March to September 1981," said Lynda.

From there Lynda underwent Police Initial Training for 3 months at the Police Academy which in 1981 was at Bourke St, Redfern, being attested as a Probationary Constable on the 4th December that year.

"I then spent my six weeks bodily training at Gosford Police Station before being transferred to Hornsby Police Station (No 16 Division) in February 1982. There I worked in General Duties, and also attended Secondary Training for six weeks at the Redfern Academy." During this time Lynda attained the rank of Constable.

The following year in Feb 1983 Lynda was transferred to Parkes Police Station, in the Central West of NSW.

"At that time I was the only female Police Officer for hundreds of kilometres, therefore being utilised for female escorts, searches and sexual assaults travelling huge distances throughout the central west," said Lynda.

"I then had the opportunity of setting up the Intelligence Office at Parkes in 1985.

Lynda resigned from the NSW Police Force in Dec 1988 with the birth of her son. In 1990 Lynda was one of the first Police country re-joiners, and started back working at Parkes Police Station in general duties and in 1997 became one of the first YLOs (Youth Liaison Officers).

"I transferred to Hornsby/Ku-ring-gai PCYC in March 2000 where I worked as a Police Programme/Youth Case Manager until October 2014."

Lynda is now the SLP (School Liaison Police) officer for the Ku-ring-Gai and Ryde Local Area Commands.

"I have had a very rewarding career with the NSW Police Force and have seen a lot of changes over the years particularly with the role of women in policing. When I started I had to wear a skirt, and was issued a handbag with a microphone kept inside," said Lynda.

"I was held back in some work incidences because I was a female, as it is fantastic to see how far the role of women in the Police has progressed in such a positive way. I've been very lucky working in a job I love," concluded Lynda.

A well done to SEN COW Lynda Hart for your 29 years' contribution to our community.

12 August, from the Hornsby Advocate: Fires could be work of an arsonist, police suspect

SEVERAL fires that have occurred in Hornsby since April could be the work of an

arsonist, police suspect. The latest incident occurred on Monday night when two plastic wheelie bins at a unit complex in May St were set alight about 10.40pm. Play equipment at a local park and a number of cars in underground car parks have also been set alight over the past few months.

“We are looking at the possibility they may be linked,” Hornsby Local Area Command crime prevention officer Paul Cleary said. “We are certainly hoping it doesn’t escalate. We would just like the general public to be conscious and report any suspicious behaviour.” Senior Constable Cleary said the incidents usually occurred towards the latter half of the week or on the weekend, between 9pm and 11pm, in the area around Sherbrook Rd, Burdett St, May St and Hunter St.


11 August, from the Australian Federal Police: Do you know what’s in your luggage?

11 August, from Police Transport command: Great safety message from Sydney Trains.

"Always cross train tracks using a footbridge or underpass, or at designated pedestrian railway crossings. Crossing anywhere else is illegal and extremely dangerous. Trespassing on the tracks is never safe. If you are on the railway tracks outside of the designated pedestrian areas, you are trespassing. This includes crossing the tracks, standing beside the railway track or anywhere inside the fenced area by the side of the tracks. No matter the time, no matter the reason, it's never safe to trespass on the tracks."

A reminder about crime prevention in your yard, garage, shed, balcony, etc.

We safely lock everything away inside our home, sometimes also protected by a burglar alarm, yet we leave items free-for-the-taking in our yards and garages. The local officers at Hornsby Police station often include this point when asked about the advice that should be given to the community. Their favourite dislike is driving down residential streets and seeing garage doors open with no one around. Think bikes, think power tools.

Please take inside and/or lock away anything you don't want stolen.

Please shut the garage door when you are not in there.

Please ensure the front door is locked when you go and work in the back garden.

Please lock your vehicles when on the driveway, and/or when they are parked in the garage.

Please lock your side gate.

And please consider installing sensor lighting around your property.

New Neighbour Tip #12. IS ANY SWIMMING POOL REGISTERED AND SECURE? Are all the laws complied with? Eg Have you a resuscitation chart on display? (The screw holes easily disintegrate.) CONSIDER REGISTERING YOUR POOL AS A STATIC WATER SUPPLY (SWS) FOR USE IN A FIRE EMERGENCY.

FACT: During bushfires, firefighters often have difficulty getting enough water. There may not be enough water in the mains to fight a major bushfire. Static water supplies, such as swimming pools, tanks and dams, may be vital sources of water for firefighters.

About the Static Water Supply (SWS) Program

The Static Water Supply (SWS) program is aimed at identifying properties with sources of water supply such as dams, creeks or swimming pools that can be used for firefighting purposes. In the event of a fire, the SWS sign and your water tank or backyard pool could save your home.

The SWS program is used to identify the location of swimming pools and other water sources in areas of high bushfire risk.

The backyard swimming pool provides an ideal emergency water supply for firefighters, using small portable pumps and hose lines, to protect your home and possessions. Your pool water will only be used as a last resort during major bushfires. The SWS sign is provided free.

If your house or property has a water source, such as a swimming pool, tank or dam, you can assist firefighters by prominently displaying a SWS plate at your property boundary so that it is readily visible from the road. Your voluntary inclusion in this program may assist the fire service to extinguish a fire should one occur in or near your home or a neighbour's home or property.

**From the North Shore Times, 14 August: School staff linked to abuse
FORMER HEADMASTER AND TEACHER COULD FACE CHARGES**

KNOX Grammar School, its headmaster for 30 years and a former teacher – who is now headmaster of another prestigious school – have all been slammed in a submission to the sex abuse royal commission. The royal commission on Tuesday made public a submission that recommends 32 adverse findings against Ian Paterson, headmaster at Knox Grammar School from 1969 to 1998. Some findings, if taken on board by the commission and recommended to the attorney-general, could see Dr Paterson face charges that carry penalties of between two and 14 years in jail.

The same submission from counsel assisting the commission, David Lloyd, says the private school had a culture among some members of the senior staff during Dr Paterson's 30-year reign of not treating child sexual abuse seriously. The lawyer also said it was open for the commission to find that Timothy Hawkes – who was boarding master at the house where a sleeping teenager was molested – knew the matter had not been reported to police.

Dr Hawkes, now headmaster of Sydney's Kings School, has told the commission he understood Dr Paterson had told authorities, including police. Mr Lloyd said Dr Hawkes ought to have notified police and reported it to the Department of

Community Services.

The commission will consider Mr Lloyd's submission along with others made in response to his recommended findings before it makes its final recommendations.

From Ku-ring-gai Council (via NST): Temporary Partial Road Closures

Council has approved temporary partial road closures of Clissold Rd, Cherry Ave and Bunyana Ave, Wahroonga on Sunday 23 August, 8am to 6pm. The closure is to allow the Historic Houses Trust of NSW to conduct the Fifties Fair at Rose Seidler House in Wahroonga. Access will be maintained for local residents and emergency vehicles.

From the North Shore Times, 14 August, Legal Matters section [edited]:

If you or someone you know was a victim of sexual abuse as a child while under the care of an institution, you can share your story with the royal commission. You can contact the commission in several ways: a confidential phone call, a written statement, an informal private session with a commissioner, or by giving evidence at a public hearing.

An independent service called **knowmore**, funded by the Federal Government and employing specialist staff, has been set up by the National Association of Community Legal Centres to provide free legal advice to people considering providing information to the royal commission.

From the Hornsby Advocate, 13 August:

WAHROONGA A 69-yearold woman awoke to find a man holding a torch standing in her bedroom on Tuesday night. The woman was unhurt and the man left the Bareena Ave home. The glass panel of a rear ground floor door was smashed, however nothing appears to have been stolen.

WAHROONGA A nineweek-old labradoodle is missing after thieves left a gate open at a property in Fox Valley Rd between 10am and 12.30pm on Tuesday. Police said a ground floor door had been jemmied open. The home was ransacked and a camera stolen.

WAHROONGA An outdoor wooden table at Wahroonga Public School was destroyed by fire between 6pm Sunday and 6.30am Monday. It is believed to have

been deliberately lit. The cost of replacing the table is about \$1000.

HORNSBY A 21-year-old man was charged with possessing a prohibited drug after he walked into Hornsby police station on Monday night and allegedly handed the officers a plastic bag containing about 42 grams of cannabis. Police later searched the man's home and allegedly located another bag containing about 25 grams of cannabis. He is due to appear at Hornsby Local Court on September 9.

WAHROONGA Police are investigating a road rage incident in Redleaf Ave on Monday night. About 7pm a 44-year-old motorist was driving out of a parking spot when he inadvertently cut off another vehicle. Words were exchanged and the dispute continued when the vehicles stopped at a nearby roundabout. One of the drivers allegedly threw a bottle at the other car and verbally abused the other motorist.

HORNSBY A substantial amount of smoke was seen coming from a unit in College Crescent about 3.30pm on Sunday. A Fire & Rescue NSW crew forced open the front door and found that a saucepan had been left on a stove, which was set on "high". The owner had left the unit about noon and forgot to turn off the stove. The unit was not damaged.

HORNSBY Two males are believed to have scrawled graffiti on the Kuring-gai Local Area Command bus while it was parked in Hornsby mall on Monday. One of the males is described as 30-40 years old, wearing a dark jacket and red pants.

BROOKLYN Police were called by WIRES to Hawkesbury River railway station about 1.30pm on Friday after a wallaby was hit by a train. Station staff carried the wallaby onto a platform where it was found to be in a distressed state after suffering a suspected broken back. The animal was carried into nearby bushland and euthanased by police.

BEROWRA HEIGHTS A car parked in Barnetts Rd had a tyre slashed between 11am and 1pm Sunday.

Crossings on the list [edited] PEDESTRIAN crossings at some of Hornsby's

busiest intersections are about to improve. The State Government will start work on a new program to protect pedestrians from turning vehicles at intersections. A NSW Transport Centre for Road Safety spokeswoman said intersections at Yarrara and Ramsay roads, Pennant Hills; The Esplanade and Eddy St, Thornleigh; Pennant Hills Rd and Wells St, Thornleigh; and Castle Hill Rd and Church St, West Pennant Hills, would be updated to reduce the risk of an accident.

From our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Car Owners;

1. WHEN YOU LEAVE YOUR CAR UNATTENDED (even short periods), CLOSE ALL WINDOWS, REMOVE KEY FROM IGNITION & LOCK ALL DOORS.

Remember, it's an offence under the Aussie Road Rules to leave your car unlocked.

2. DON'T HIDE SPARE KEYS ON YOUR VEHICLE. Don't kid yourself—thieves know ALL the best hiding places!

3. ENSURE YOU HAVE REMOVED ALL PROPERTY FROM VIEW [mobile phone, sunglasses, CDs (burn copies?), bag, wallet, loose change, clothing, laptop, ipod]. EITHER TAKE IT WITH YOU, OR LOCK IT IN THE BOOT. REMOVE ALL SIGNS THAT PROPERTY MAY BE IN THE CAR. eg no blankets covering tempting lumps on the back seat, no carrier bags.

4. REMOVE ANY GPS FROM SIGHT. IF IT WAS MOUNTED ON THE WINDSCREEN—REMOVE THE TELL-TALE MARK.

5. DO NOT OVERLOAD VEHICLES. KNOW YOUR VEHICLE'S LIMIT. It's worth making two trips.

6. PARK IN WELL-LIT, HIGH PEDESTRIAN AREAS, PREFERABLY WITH CCTV. AVOID CAR PARKS WITH A HISTORY OF BREAK-INS.

and 14. REMEMBER TO TAKE YOUR PARKING TICKET WITH YOU. This makes it difficult for the thief to steal your car.


