

05 September, from Ku-ring-gai Police Area Command




Police are continuing to appeal for public assistance for information on the disappearance of Mosese Cava in 2006 from the Marrickville area.

Fijian-born Mosese was last known as a DJ in the Sydney area, and was described as having long dreadlocks.

04 September, from Ku-ring-gai Police Area Command: Did you know that NSW Police were used to escort gold in the gold rush days?



With the discovery of gold in New South Wales, the 'Gold Escort' were formed in 1851.

During this period, police from the United Kingdom were offered free passage to NSW in return for three years' service as colonial police. These years also saw the rise of the bushranging era.

In 1862, riots on the goldfields at Lambing Flat (near Young) saw police and the military deployed to restore peace and lead to a new push for more effective policing in the colony.

One significant incident during this time was the robbery at Escort Rock.

On June 15, 1862 one of the most audacious acts of bushranging in Australia's history took place near the village of Eugowra in New South Wales Central West Region. The place is now known as 'Escort Rock'.

Frank Gardiner and his gang of about eight bushrangers, which sometimes included the infamous Ben Hall, held up a gold coach which was travelling from Forbes to Sydney.

In the shootout that followed at Escort Rock, the bushrangers overwhelmed the four police escorts, leaving two of the officers wounded and making off with around 2700 ounces of gold (around 76kg) and a number of bags filled with cash.

It was the largest gold robbery in Australia's history with the majority of the gold still unaccounted for and in today's currency would amount to many millions of dollars. Have a great weekend.

02 September, from NSW Police Force



A man has been charged with attempted murder after a police officer was slashed in the head and shoulder, and two others were injured in the Sydney CBD this morning.

Officers from Sydney City Police area Command were contacted after a food delivery rider was allegedly harassed by a man on George Street about 12.20am (Wednesday 2 September 2020).

As a result of inquiries, officers approached a man as he was walking along York Street near Market Street.

Police will allege in court that the man removed a knife from his pocket and attacked the officers, and a struggle ensued.

One officer was slashed across his head and shoulder and another officer was slashed on the hand, before a third officer was bitten on the arm.

The 32-year-old man was then disarmed and arrested, before being taken to St Vincent's Hospital for assessment.

The injured officers were also taken to St Vincent's Hospital, with the 40-year-old male senior constable undergoing treatment for a laceration to the left side of his head and a second laceration to his left upper arm/shoulder a 39-year-old male acting sergeant receiving treatment for a laceration on his finger and a knee injury, while the 20-year-old male probationary constable treated for a bite to his tricep. Following his release from hospital, the 32-year-old Lakemba man was taken to Day Street Police Station.

He has now been charged with cause wounding/grievous bodily harm to person with intent to murder, wound person with intent to resist/prevent arrest, assault police officer in execution of duty cause actual bodily harm and resist or hinder police officer in the execution of duty.

The man has been refused bail to appear at Downing Centre Local Court today.

The AFP is urging all Australians to confront the realities of child exploitation and it's prevalence in our community. It is easy to turn scroll past the almost daily news of another child exploitation bust.

But no one saved their kids by covering their ears or eyes.

It is time to listen up and put our kids first. We need parents and caregivers to understand how their children are being targeted, how technology invites strangers into their kids' bedrooms and to partner with us to fight this insidious crime.

If it takes a village to raise a child, it now takes a country to keep them safe.

PSA: The tooth fairy accepts molars, premolars, incisors and canine teeth...not Beretta pistols.

In fact, possession of drugs and firearms is more likely to get you a visit from the AFP than the tooth fairy, as two Melbourne men discovered in June 2019 when they were arrested as part of an investigation into to a syndicate trafficking both methamphetamine and heroin in Melbourne.

During search warrants on properties Docklands and Sunshine North, AFP officers seized 2,747.2g pure methamphetamine, 324.1g pure heroin, six bottles containing Butanediol, \$318,170 cash, multiple scales, a cash counting machine, drug paraphernalia, acetone (alleged to be for the purpose of 'washing' methamphetamine), ammunition and a loaded Beretta brand pistol which was located under a pillow on the bed.

The two men plead guilty to range of charges and were recently sentenced to a combined 19 years, 6 months in jail.

Remember:

Tooth under pillow = a visit from tooth fairy.

Guns and illicit drugs under pillow = a visit from the AFP.

Three Melbourne men have been arrested and around \$52.5 million dollars' worth of a substance similar to methamphetamine has been seized, after a multi-agency law enforcement operation overnight.

When police went through the door of a Victorian property yesterday, they discovered several barrels containing 100kgs of the illicit drug and significant precursor chemicals at a large-scale clandestine drug laboratory under construction.

If police had not intervened and this laboratory had had become functioning, it is believed this would have been one of the largest illicit clandestine labs in Victoria's history.

This successful operation was jointly carried out by the AFP, Victoria Police, Australian Border Force and the Australian Criminal Intelligence Commission

04 September, from Northern Beaches Police Area Command



Police are continuing to appeal for public assistance to find a man missing from Sydney's Northern Beaches.

Christopher Chalmers, also known as CJ, aged 52, was last seen at a service station on the Pacific Highway, Turramurra, about 4.40am on Thursday 30 July 2020.

A family member reported him missing to officers from Northern Beaches Police Area Command.

Despite numerous inquiries, he has not been located and concerns are held for his welfare.

He described as being of Caucasian appearance, about 170cm tall, of medium build, with olive skin and brown eyes. He drives a purple Honda Odyssey with Queensland registration 867SEA.

Anyone who sees Mr Chalmers or his vehicle is urged to contact Dee Why Police Station on (02) 9971 3399 or Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.

The man is known to frequent Seaforth, Narrabeen and Turramurra.

Criminals are often opportunists, and will target homes with poor home security to steal belongings. You can secure your home by taking a few simple steps which will significantly lower the risk of your home being the target of thieves. Here are some simple steps we all can take to help protect our home.

Secure your home

- Fit quality security doors, windows, locks, alarms, lighting and warning signs
- Secure all windows and doors.
- Activate your alarm, smoke detectors and security lighting.
- Lock your gates, sheds and garages.


Check your home

- Ensure your street number is clearly visible.
- Keep trees and shrubs trimmed to improve visibility around your home
- Lock away items such as ladders, tools and gardening equipment.
- Don't leave spare keys outside the home.
- Don't leave valuables, mobile devices or keys (home or vehicle) in clear view.
- Mark valuable property and record details.

When away from home

- Use a timer to activate an internal light or radio to give the impression someone is home.
- Have family, a trusted friend or neighbour check on your home. Inform them of your travel plans, park a vehicle in the driveway, collect the garbage bins and mail.
- Consider redirecting your mail, newspapers and deliveries.
- Never advertise your travel on social media sites.

Tip#1. MAKE A MENTAL NOTE IF THERE HAVE BEEN REPEATED BUSH FIRES IN YOUR AREA RECENTLY. 70% of NSW bush fires are lit deliberately.

Tip#2. BE AWARE OF PEOPLE ACTING SUSPICIOUSLY IN YOUR AREA.

Record details such as their appearance, car descriptions & registrations. Contact Crime Stoppers: 1 300 333 000.

Tip#3. CONTACT THE LOCAL FIRE SERVICE FOR HELP ASSESSING YOUR OWN PREMISE'S FIRE RISK AND KNOW HOW TO PROTECT IT. Prepare your BUSHFIRE SURVIVAL PLAN, EMERGENCY EVACUATION PLAN and

EMERGENCY SURVIVAL KIT for you and your animals. Download the 'Bush Fire Emergency Plan' App.

Tip#4. CONTACT YOUR LOCAL CRIME PREVENTION OFFICER FOR FURTHER STRATEGIES TO REDUCE CRIME. [A Safety Audit of your home is available FREE on request—phone: 9476 9723 or visit www.police.nsw.gov.au.]

Tip#5. PLEASE BE ALERT AROUND SCHOOLS DURING THE SCHOOL HOLIDAY PERIODS AND AT WEEKENDS. Report any suspicious activity or groups of youths. Phone School Security Unit: 1300 880 02.

Tip#6. FOR BUSINESSES, INCLUDE ARSON IN YOUR BUSINESS RISK ASSESSMENT PLAN AND INCLUDE ARSON RISK REDUCTION STRATEGIES IN YOUR RISK MANAGEMENT PLAN.

Tip#7. FOR BUSINESSES, ARE ALL YOUR FIRE EXITS IDENTIFIED, ACCESSIBLE, UNLOCKED, CLEAR OF BOXES, ETC?

Tip#8. KNOW ABOUT TOTAL FIRE BANS:

X CHECK THE RFS WEBSITE, OR PHONE RFS INFORMATION LINE ON 1800 679 737 TO FIND OUT IF THERE IS A TOTAL FIRE BAN IN PLACE.

X BEWARE SPARKS: BBQs, incinerators, welding, angle-grinders, cigarettes, etc.

X KNOW THE LAW: eg, to use an the electric/gas BBQ you must have available “an immediate and continuous supply of water”.

X TOTAL FIRE BAN & CURRENT FIRE DANGER CAN BE FOUND AT:

Tip#9. MAINTAIN ADEQUATE LEVELS OF HOME AND CONTENTS INSURANCE. If you underestimate the value of your property, any payout may be reduced accordingly.
