29 June: Hornsby Police news, 29/6/15 The following relate to local issues in the Kuring gai Local Area Command.

Incident: 3 x middle range drink driving charges

Details: 2 Holden Commodores were seen travelling along the Pacific Highway, Mt Kuring gai and appeared to be travelling above the speed limit and in convey. Police followed one Commodore into Beaumont Road and stopped the driver. As this occurred the second Commodore also travelled into Beaumont Road and passed the police car. While police were speaking to the first driver the second Commodore returned and was stopped by police and the driver was spoken to. Both drivers were given roadside breath tests with both drivers allegedly positive for alcohol. Further tests gave a result of .099 for a 22 year old male and .147 for a 24 year old male. Both were charged and had their respective licences suspended by police. They will attend court at a later date.

A second incident involved a Holden with a 52 year old male driver. About 1.05am Sunday 28th the Holden was stopped near Hornsby Police station on Peats Ferry Road. The driver was given a roadside breath test which was allegedly positive for alcohol. A further test gave a result of .145. The driver had his licence suspended by police and he was charged. He will appear at Hornsby Court at a later date.

Incident: Male urinating on public bus.

Time/Date: About 4am Sunday 28th

Place: Public passenger bus.

Details: A bus driver has stopped at the Hornsby police station asking for police help. It is alleged a male passenger aged 21 was travelling on the bus and asked the driver to stop so he could go to the toilet. The driver advised he could not stop at that time and told the passenger he would have to wait. The male then went to the rear of the bus and is alleged to have urinated on the floor. The stream has travelled along the floor of the bus to the front; the bus contained about 6 other passengers at the time. It was soon after the driver stopped and asked police to remove the male. The male was removed from the bus received a ticket for the offence. The bus continued on its journey.

Steal from motor vehicle incident

Details: Between Thursday night and Friday morning A Toyota was parked on the street in Pretoria Parade, Hornsby, presumably unlocked. At some point a person entered the car, it appears nothing was taken. Also a Dominos Pizza delivery car was parked on the Pacific Highway, Pymble between 10.40pm and 11pm on Saturday 27th. Someone has taken the opportunity to steal the Dominos sign attached to the car.

Stolen motor vehicle incident;

A Mazda 6 was parked on Pretoria Parade, Hornsby, between late Thursday 25th and early Friday 26th the car was stolen while parked on the street.

Incident: Burnt out car

Time/Date: About 11.15pm Friday 26th

Place: McDonalds car park Thornleigh.

Details: Police and fire brigade units Holden were called to the Thornleigh McDonalds due to a car on fire. At the scene a Holden Statesman was seen well alight. Fire brigade units have put the fire out. CCTV was viewed which showed the car arrived about 10.30pm which a crowd nearby. About 11.15pm a male figure is seen to throw something onto the bonnet of the car, the car has then erupted into flames with the group running for the area. It is not known if the car was stolen or not, inquiries with the owner, who lives in St Clair are continuing.

Found bike in Berowra.

About 10.30am Friday 26th a community member has found a ladies push bike at the Berowra Community hall. The bike was taken to Hornsby police station for safe keeping, it is hoped the owner can be found and the bike returned. So if you have lost or had your ladies bike stolen we may have it at Hornsby police station. For

obvious reasons details like brand and colour are not published, but the owner should know if it's missing.

29 June, from Crime Stoppers: CCTV Cameras and the Law...

Did you know that if you have security cameras on your property, then by law, you must erect up a sign/notice to say that CCTV is in operation. NSW has no rules to restrict indoor use as long as all occupants are aware and consent. If the camera is outside or facing the street recording public property, a clear sign must be erected to inform passers by they may be monitored. It is also illegal to point a camera on private property or anywhere a person would expect to have privacy (e.g. windows or a neighbour's backyard). Additional rules and by laws apply for renters wanting to place cameras on common property, please consult your landlord or strata manager for more information.

REBELS outlaw motorcycle club enforcer Mark Easter was so badly disfigured from gunshots to his head that police had to identify him from his tattoos when his body was found on Friday morning. The executed body of Mr Easter, who was the Sergeant at Arms of the Rebels' city chapter, was found by council workers near the Pacific Highway at Cowan shortly after his family had reported him missing. Detective Inspector Grant Taylor from the homicide squad said the 37-year-old from Little Bay in Sydney's south had last been seen by his de facto having dinner at Potts Point on Tuesday night.

"We are very keen to hear from anyone who might have some knowledge of his movements between then and the discovery of his body on Friday morning," said

DI Taylor. He said police are looking closely at his links with the outlaw motorcycle gang and confirmed Mr Easter was a close associate of Rebels Windsor chapter president John Weston.

GEORGINA Bartter told her close friend shortly before buying the ecstasy pills that would end her life "I'm not taking three at Harbourlife. I'll die." The state's chief Magistrate Graeme Henson said "and so she did", noting the tragedy of the 19-year-old's death as he sentenced her close friend Rebecca Hannibal, who pleaded guilty to supplying the drug, to a 12-month good behaviour bond. Judge Henson said "the real evil is not present in this courtroom" and slammed the conduct of "organised criminals" who distribute the drug on to "low-level" drug dealers.

Did you know that you can contact Crime Stoppers to report incidents of Animal Cruelty?

Examples of cruel acts which could form the basis of a complaint are:

- Animals which are exposed to extreme heat or cold (eg animals left in cars), or which are not adequately sheltered.
- Animals which are suffering from hunger or thirst.
- Animals which are hurt or abused.
- Animals which are left untreated following an injury or illness.
- Animals which are abandoned or which do not receive regular care.
- Animals for which their environment is not suited to their needs through size, breed, infirmity etc.
- Animals which are used to perform an illegal activity, eg where dogs or game

cocks are encouraged to fight each other.





From the Hornsby Advocate, 25 June:

Police urging people to help watch schools

AS SCHOOLS close tomorrow afternoon for the start of the winter holidays they

will inevitably become targets for anti-social behaviour, police warn. Malicious damage and graffiti attacks on school properties escalate by as much as four times during holiday periods, according to Ku-ring-gai Local Area Command crime prevention officer Paul Cleary. "What we tend to find in the summer months is we have a few more alcohol problems (on school grounds)," he said. "In the winter months what we are tending to see, particularly in July, is they tend to light fires ... if they light them in the wrong spot it can actually spread to buildings and other structures like that." Ultimately it was the students who suffered as a result of the damage, SenConstable Cleary said. "The cost of repairs and to replace items all comes out of the school budget," he said. "That money could be put back into the school to upgrade computers, give kids more books and excursions, things like that. The effects go beyond the actual damage." Police will be stepping up patrols of schools and urge residents to report any suspicious behaviour. "We would just like to nip it in the bud and send a clear message to kids, ' Expect somebody may be watching you' if you're trespassing," he said.

DOG SAFETY IS YOUR RESPONSIBILITY



Keep your dogs under control. There have been over 10 reported dog attacks in the local region since April and this has resulted in people and dogs being injured. Dogs are valued family pets and provide companionship and security, but responsibility comes with dog ownership as dogs can cause very serious injuries very quickly.

The law is clear on the control you must have. Your dog must be under control in your yard or on a leash if in public. You can let your dogs free in an off-leash area, but you must keep them from injuring other dogs or people. Responsible dog ownership will prevent injuries.

1 BEROWRA Inquiries are continuing after an amount of homemade pepper spray and a mini pick axe were found under the driver's seat of a car at the intersection of Berowra Waters Rd and the Pacific Highway on Saturday. 3 WAHROONGA A home in Ingala Ave had its flyscreen door cut and rear glass sliding door forced open between midnight and 5.25am yesterday while the occupants slept. An alarm was activated which is believed to have scared off the intruders. Another home, in Jubilee Ave, Wahroonga, also had its flyscreen door cut between 11pm Tuesday and 7.45am yesterday. Attempts had been made to force open the front door. The owners were asleep at the time.

2 HORNSBY A man was arrested after he was seen acting suspiciously in Albert Lane on Tuesday. Occupants of a unit block were on their balcony and spotted a man outside a ground floor unit about 1.50pm. When they questioned whether he was looking for someone, the man replied "no". He was seen 10 minutes later in the same area and the residents called police. Police searched two bags the man was carrying and allegedly found a number of toiletries and vitamin tablets. The man, 47, from Campsie, was taken to Hornsby police station and charged with goods in custody.

Advice for restraining a dog properly whilst in or on a vehicle.

In addition to Traffic Infringements, if an animal is injured as a result of being unrestrained, owners may also face penalties under the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act. RSPCA Australia advises people to ensure their dog's restraint is long enough to allow them to stand and lie down, but not so long that he could jump or fall over the edge of the moving vehicle. Use swivels to attach the restraint to both the vehicle and the dog's collar to prevent the chain from tangling.
