5th August: Hornsby Police news, 5/8/13 The following relate to local issues in the Kuring gai Local Area Command.

Incident: Speeding and high range drink driving
Time/Date: About 11.30pm on Sunday the 4th
Place: M1 Motorway (F3).
Vehicle 1: Ford Laser
Driver 1: 55 year old male from Berowra Heights.

Details: Police have observed the Ford Laser which appeared to be travelling above the speed limit. A check by the LIDAR revealed a speed of 138km/h in the 80 km/h speed zone. The car was stopped and the driver spoken to. A roadside breath test gave an alleged positive result for alcohol. A subsequent test gave a result of .153. The driver had his license suspended by police and was charged.

Court: The male is to appear at the Hornsby local Court on the 29th of August charged with Driving with a driving with a High Range Prescribed Concentration of Alcohol and exceeding the speed limit by more than 45km/h.

Incident: 3 vehicle crash

Place: Ryde road, West Pymble.
Vehicle 1: Subaru
Driver 1: 83 year old male.
Vehicle 2: Semi trailer
Vehicle 3: a small rigid truck

Details: The semi was travelling in lane 3 of 3 on Ryde road north bound, the Subaru was in lane 2 of 3 beside the truck. At some point the prime mover of the semi and the Subaru have collided, this caused the Subaru to swerve and veer across the medium strip and into the path of a small rigid truck travelling southbound. The Subaru was extensively damaged with the driver and his daughter both being taken to RNSH with minor injuries. The semi and the rigid truck received only minor damage. Due to conflicting versions and no independent witnesses no action is being taken in relation to the collision.

Incident: Mountain bike crash
Time/Date: About 2.40pm on Friday the 2nd
Place: About 700 m along the bush track from Stewart avenue, Hornsby.
Rider: 25 year old male

Details: The rider and a fellow rider were riding along the bush track and about 700m in the 25 year old rider has made a series of large jumps. On a downhill decent the rider has made further large jumps, on the last of these the rider had an awkward landing with the rider going over the handle bars. The rider has landed in his head. The witness (fellow rider) stopped rendering assistance, it was noted the rider had difficulty breathing at this time. 000 were called with an ambulance attending, due to the injuries the SCAT crew were called and airlifted the rider to RNSH with a collapsed lung and head trauma.

At this point the male (described above) was seen on a landing inside the house. The owner has called out 'get out' with the offender at first freezing then running from the house. Police were called and attended; the dog squad attended and tracked a scent to Mona Vale road, before losing the scent. The owner noticed an Iphone and \$150 missing from a wallet but the wallet was left behind.

"At this stage of the project's development it is crucial that the public have their say," Supt Willott said. "With this in mind, we have setup The NSW Police Force Community Portal Survey. Police will use the community's feedback, opinions and views to further develop the online crime reporting portal before it 'goes live'. ASSISTANCE REQUIRED - THE HILLS BREAK-INS

Over the past 3 weeks we have seen a lull in the number of break and enters in the Beaumont Hills area however yesterday the area was hit again:

Between 10am and 2:15pm yesterday, Wednesday 31st July a resident returned to their Farmer Circuit home to find that offenders had gained entry by smashing the small window pane next to the front door. The house had been ransacked and numerous valuable items were stolen including jewellery and computers.

31st July: Fact Sheet - National Missing Persons Week 2013

Missing Persons week 2013 will commence on Sunday 28 July 2013 and run until Saturday 3 August 2013. The focus for this year's Missing Persons Week is Mental Health-People living with a Mental Illness are at greater risk of going missing. The campaign this year urges people to 'see the signs before they disappear.'

Key Messages

- During 2012 in NSW 12,409 people were reported to NSW police as Missing. Of those, 12,325 were located.
- NSW Police are currently investigating 650 Long term cases
- Over 35,000 people are reported missing each year in Australia-one person every 15 minutes
- Of those reported missing to police, over 95 per cent are located within a short period of time (usually one week)

- Over half, 60 percent of those reported missing are under 18 years. Nearly 10 percent of persons reported missing are aged over 60
- Males and female go missing in equal numbers
- For every missing person reported, at least 12 other people are affected whether it is emotionally, physically, psychologically or financially. Those affected can be family, friends, work colleagues and the wider community. As a result, each year almost half a million people in Australia feel the impact when someone goes missing
- As an organisation, the NSW Police Force is continuously investigating and exploring opportunities to help reunite missing persons with their loved ones.
- Do not wait 24 hours to report someone is missing if there are fears for their safety and their location is unknown.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1. Is it a crime to go missing?

No, it is not an offence to go missing. Police, or a person in authority have to sight to person, event if they have returned home, after they have been reported missing to ensure that they are safe and well

2. What is the aim of National Missing Persons Week (NMPW)?

National Missing Persons Week is an annual event to raise awareness of the issues and impacts associated with Missing Persons. This year will run from 28th July to 3 August 2013. The theme this year will be Mental Health-“People living with a mental illness are at greater risk of going missing.” The campaign this year urges people to ‘see the signs before they disappear.’

3. How many Australians go missing each year?

- It is estimated that 35,000 people are reported missing each year in Australia, with the amount of reports equivalent to one person every 15 minutes.
- Of those reported missing to police, over 95 per cent are located within a short period of time (usually one week).
- Long term missing persons (missing for 12 months or longer) are more likely to be adults.

4. Which state has the highest missing person rate?

- The majority of missing persons’ reports are from the larger states, with more than 31% coming from New South Wales. This is due to the higher populations in this state.
- Active investigations and regular media coverage and calls for public assistance by families may also tend to encourage higher levels of reporting in these states.

5. Why do people go missing?

People go missing for a variety of reasons, which may include

- Mental health, particularly anxiety and depression.
- Alcohol and illicit drug problems
- For young people, family dysfunction and conflict or violence, issues associated with puberty and peer pressure, mental health issues, and drug and alcohol problems were the reasons.
- In old age, Dementia and Alzheimer’s can cause a person to wander off or go missing.

- The main groups of people who go missing are: Young people, older people suffering dementia and mentally ill people.

6. What support is available for family and friends of missing persons?

30th July: Police believe road rage maybe behind a two car crash on the F3 Freeway north of Sydney last night (28 July 2013).

Two cars were travelling south on the F3 at Mount Colah. Police have been told that objects were thrown by the occupants of at least one of the vehicles towards a second car before one of the drivers rammed the other. One of the vehicles flipped, landing on its roof and trapping a female passenger aged in her 20s. She was later taken to hospital with leg injuries. The other vehicle continued driving to Gordon Police Station, on Sydney's upper north shore. The crash closed two lanes of the Freeway causing extensive traffic delays into Sydney. An investigation has been launched into the cause of the crash. Both drivers are expected to be interviewed.

The 'All Areas' Neighbourhood Watch (NHW) groups had a meeting last week with representatives invited from every NHW group within the Kuring gai Local Area Command (LAC). We also managed to tempt a coordinator from the Roseville NHW Area, Dr Bruce McAdam, with Roseville being within the Ku-ring-gai Council LGA but within the North Shore Police LAC.

A warning to share from our Crime Prevention Officer, Snr Con Paul Cleary, for those in the West Pymble and East Killara areas - there has been a spate of break & enters where the method of entry was by removing the putty seal from around windows in order to remove the glass. The break-ins were between 12 and 4pm. What can we do? The best defence is a good

alarm system, good neighbours, and a dog. Please don't just check your windows now that you've read this - do a full security audit of your home!

Also, please be aware if you live in a block of units that underground car parks and cages are still being targeted, especially for high-end bikes and power tools. What can we do? Use a good padlock on your cage. Take any garage remote control out of the car and up to your unit with you. Remote controls have been taken for access in the future. Don't leave car keys or remotes by your front door.

Local businesses have been targeted for the cash in their tills. And then there's the regular warning about mailbox/ID theft - clear your mailbox and shred anything with your personal details on it, rather than bin it.

REMEMBER BICYCLES ARE VEHICLES TOO! As a motorist always make sure you:

- Change lanes when overtaking bike riders on multi-lane roads and **allow at least a metre** when overtaking bike riders in a single lane situation.
- Check for pedestrians, bike riders and motorcyclists before you turn or proceed at intersections.
- Check for bike riders before opening your car door or driving away from the kerb. **It is illegal to cause a hazard** to any bike rider, pedestrian or vehicle by opening a door or getting off or out of a vehicle.
- Give way to people walking and riding bikes when entering or leaving a driveway or side road.
- Check your blind spots - you never know who may be there.
- Be aware that bike riders can legally:

- ride in a traffic lane even if a shoulder lane is provided

- pass to the left of stopped vehicles, except when those vehicles are indicating and turning left.
