11th March: Community reminder

This is just a gentle reminder when out and about in public. Know where your handbag and other personal property is at all time. Once or twice a month Hornsby police get reports of handbags being stolen from shoppers. They are mainly taken from the seat of a shopping trolley, sometimes they get taken from the floor or seat while at a cafe or the like. An opportunistic thief will target someone they think is an easy target (like leaving your handbag in the trolley) then in a matter of seconds while you are distracted they will strike - either taking the bag itself or your wallet/purse from the bag. Police would like to remind you all that you should (must) always have a physical hold of your handbag. This also goes for when you actually pay for an item. Don't be rushed, take your time, put everything away and make sure you have everything safely secured, then get your shopping. If you're 'overloaded' with shopping maybe you should make two or more trips just to be safe.

11th March: AUSTRALIA'S emergency services are set to launch a long-awaited triple-0 smartphone application to respond more quickly to people in a crisis.

The app, developed by the national Triple Zero Awareness Work Group, which includes police, State Emergency Service, fire and ambulance services, gives clear options for which organisation to call in a crisis, connects the call and provides GPS co-ordinates of the phone's location.

The director of community safety at Fire and Rescue NSW and chairman of the group, Assistant Commissioner Mark Whybro, said the app was designed to cut the number of people calling triple-0 when they needed the SES or Police Assistance Line. "It improves the time it takes to get help, the right help, to someone who need it," he said. Figures from Telstra show 9 million people call triple-0 a year, 41 per cent of whom are not connected to state call centres as they are not in an emergency. On average, it took 11 seconds to find out where someone was. The GPS aspect of the app allows a quicker response. It displays latitude and longitude, a map of the area, and an approximate address, accurate to within 10 metres, which the caller reads out to operators. The application is fully-developed for iPhones, and the group has applied for \$50,000 in federal funding to expand to Android and Windows operating systems. They plan to launch it for free in September or October after thorough testing.

11th March: There has been an **increase in stolen hand bags, wallets and lap tops** from shopping centres. We understand how hectic it gets in the shopping centres and car parks so Police are reminding people to keep their property safe. So please don't take offence if the police stop you and remind you about the safety of your property and if you could, remind family and friends about keeping their property safe.



8th March, from our neighbouring command North Shore LAC, good news following on from our February 28th warning: COMMUNITY TIP OFF LEADS TO SUSPICIOUS MALE BEING STOPPED BY POLICE.

North Shore Police were alerted yesterday by one of our very observant Facebook followers that a suspicious male posing as a 'Tree Lopper' was back in the area knocking on doors. The very observant and alert member of the community immediately contacted Police and supplied not only a description of the suspicious male, but also his ute's registration number and even a photograph of his ute. A short time later the ute was stopped by Police in Chatswood and the driver spoken to about his intentions.



New members to our Facebook page may think this doesn't sound like much of a problem, however in recent months men posing as tree loppers have been in the area knocking on doors and preying on our vulnerable and elderly members of the community. They offer to cut down low hanging branches and then charge hundreds of dollars for fives minutes work. In some instances the tree loppers will claim to be working for the local council and then charge people for the work. On other occasions the males have been known to return to the same premises on an almost weekly basis charging elderly people thousands of dollars for little or no work.

If you get someone knocking on your door offering similar services, who you believe is suspicious, contact your local police station immediately.

7th March: Here's some handy hints to better protect your home CHECKLIST: BURGLARY PREVENTION

DO:

- Lock your home every time you leave – even if only for short while.
- If you lose your keys or they are stolen, change the locks on your home as soon as possible.
- Check that your door frames are secure and that your doors fit properly.
- Lock your front door when you are at the back of the house or in the garden.
- Install a peep hole in your front door and check the identity of visitors before letting them in.
- Lock away your ladders and tools to prevent offenders from using them to break in.
- Keep shrubs and trees well trimmed, particularly those close to windows and doors.
- Install key-operated locks on all windows.
- Use laminated glass or shatter-resistant film on windows.
- Secure garages and sheds on your property.
- Engrave your property with your name or drivers licence number.
- Photograph property that you cannot engrave.
- Make a register of your valuable property, recording serial numbers and descriptions.
- Photograph them and store this in a safe place.
- If you are going away, cancel deliveries, turn the telephone down and ask a trusted friend or neighbour to keep an eye on your home.

DON'T:

- Leave spare keys outside your home.
- Attach your name and address to your keys.
- Leave notes on the front door advising visitors that you are absent.
- When away, do not leave a message on your answering machine advising callers that you are away.
- Keep large amounts of cash at home.

CONSIDER:

- If you live in a high-risk location, consider fitting security grilles.
- Installing an alarm system.
- Joining or starting a Neighbourhood Watch Program in your area.

6th March, from our Crime Prevention Officer, Snr Con Paul Cleary: Apathy among car owners in Hornsby. Now that I have your attention I'll explain.

Apathy as you know is the lack of concern, laziness, indifference, lack of interest etc you get the message. Due to the ongoing reports to police of steal from motor vehicle (SFMV) offences which in some areas is increasing the Crime Prevention Officer or CPO (me) decided to 'walk' the usual commuter parking areas around Hornsby CBD. I also ventured into the Westfield Burdette street car park. In these parking areas there are signs visible advising the Lock it or lose it message. I have also reported in media releases and warnings over the last few years of

not leaving property in cars when you leave them. So armed with the knowledge that motorists (commuters and shoppers) still leave property inside cars I copied 50 locally produced flyers advising the Lock it or Lose it message and went for a walk.

Jersey Street South 8 cars in the 'all day' parking areas had various property in full view from the roadway. Property like GPS units, cash in console, Scanner/transmitter type radio and a laptop bag which looked like it had a laptop in it. I left a flyer on all these cars windscreens. I then went to the railway commuter car park on the eastern side. The first car I looked at had a GPS on the dash. More cars had GPS units and bags that looked like they had 'goodies' inside. The rest of the car park revealed similar results in all about 14 cars with property in full view in that car park. I even got a trifecta that is 3 cars in a row all with GPS units on the dash. So more flyers were placed under the wipers. Onto the Car park Burdette x George st and the Hornsby Inn car park where another 3 cars had property on display. The Westfield car park covering all levels of the Burdette street side resulted in the remaining 25 flyers being placed under wipers. 1 car had 2 GPS units on the dash, 1 car had a kids DVD on the headrest, more cash in consoles, mobile phones etc. I actually thought 50 flyers would be overkill but it took me just 1 hour and 20 minutes to place all 50 flyers under the wipers of cars with property that was in full view and by full view I mean 3 or 4 metres from the car. Why am I writing this? Well as the CPO it falls on me to educate, warn and advise on all things to do with crime prevention. There are thieves about and they look for opportunistic crimes, crimes like breaking into cars and stealing what they can. By leaving things in your cars and especially in full view is like leaving a kid in a candy shop and walking out the door. Think of it another way you leave \$5 in change in the console that can be seen from outside, or you leave the GPS on the screen, maybe a bag on the back seat. A thief doesn't care about your windows or doors they will smash/force or break whatever they can to get their target. So your \$70 GPS now costs you \$500 for the broken locks or smashed window and your \$70 GPS on top of that. Well guess what else? Your GPS stores all sorts of info on you. Where, when and how long you spend somewhere like your home address, the school you drop your kids off to I'm not sure if you can see where I'm going here but the GPS may not be all that is taken.

The GPS has your home address do you leave your garage remote in the car?????? Have you now technically left your door key for a thief?

So please don't leave any property in your cars when you leave them this includes over night at home. If it can be seen it is leaving you and your car open to risk.

Take everything out, if for some reason you can't take it with you then lock it in the boot. If you are a commuter why do you need the GPS in the car? Surely you know the way there by now!



Incidents in the Kuring gai Local Area Command dated Monday 11th March 2013:

Incident: High range drink driving

Time/Date: About 11.40pm on Saturday the 9th
Place: Pacific highway, Pymble near Telegraph road.
Vehicle 1: Audi
Driver 1: 51 year old female from a Wahroonga address.

Details: The Audi was being driven North on the Pacific highway and when at Telegraph road has collided with a Subaru Wagon which was stationary at a red traffic light. Police have attended and spoken to both drivers a roadside breath test for the female Audi driver allegedly gave a positive result of alcohol. A subsequent test gave a result of .168. The driver had her license suspended by police and was charged. Neither driver was injured in the collision.

Court: The female is to appear at the Hornsby local Court on the 11th of April charged with driving with a high range concentration of alcohol.

Incident: Driver reverses over fence.
Time/Date: About 12:40 on Friday the 8th
Place: Murial street and Florence street, Hornsby
Vehicle 1: Toyota Landcruiser
Driver 1: 71 year old male

Details: About 12.40 pm the 71 year old male driver has reversed his car from the roundabout at that intersection. For unknown reasons the driver has continued reversing over a street sign and over a fence. The driver was not visibly injured but was taken to Hornsby Hospital due to recent surgery as a precaution. A question of fitness to hold a license will be forwarded to the RMS.

Incident: Children left in car.
Time/Date: About 12.15pm on Sunday the 10th
Place: Gordon Centre shopping complex car park. level 2

Details: A 42 year old male has attended the Gordon Shopping complex and parked his car leaving his 3 children aged 2, 4&6 inside with the air conditioning turned. The male driver has then gone to the shops. A witness has seen the children in the car and called police. Police have spoken to both parties and reminded the male it was an offence to leave unattended children in a car. DOC's were called by police in relation to the matter.

Incident: Arrest for stealing
Time/Date: About 1.45am on Saturday the 9th
Place: Westfield Hornsby
Person 1: 19 year old male

Details: About 1.45 am a stand alone kiosk in Westfield Hornsby as seen on CCTV was entered by a male who was seen to allegedly carry an item out of the area of the Kiosk. About 12.30 pm on Saturday as a result of investigations a 19 year old male from Hornsby was questioned. A search of his home allegedly revealed a small free standing safe which police will allege came from the Kiosk. The safe allegedly contained \$2,900 cash this was recovered by police. Investigations are continuing into the matter.

Incident: Break, Enter & Steal
Time/Date: Between 7.30 am and 8.40 pm on Tuesday the 5th
Place: Sharon Cl, HORNSBY

Details: Unknown person/s have broken into the home via a ground floor window. At this stage 3 laptop computers are known to have been taken. They were valued at \$2,000.

Incident: Stealing from PCYC
Time/Date: Between 8 pm on Sunday 3 March and 7 pm on Tuesday 5 March
Place: PCYC George street, Hornsby

Details: Unknown person/s have broken into the PCYC by forcing the lock on a ground floor door. While inside some equipment used for Martial arts has been stolen. The equipment included a sword, face mask and padding. It was valued at \$2,000.

Incident: Attempted shop stealing
Time/Date: Between 11:39am and 11:45am on Thursday the 7th
Place: Display shelf in David Jones Hornsby
Person 1: Described as being in her 30s, having dark or black hair, wearing a red shirt, black track pants, white runners, and carrying a brown handbag.

Details: A female is seen on CCTV to remove 15 polo type shirts from a display and place them into a 'duffle' bag and walk to the exit of the store. The female is then seen to toss the bag under a table and leave the store. Police are seeking and information into this incident. The shirts were valued at \$1,800.

Incident: Car damaged by water
Time/Date: Between 9pm and midnight on Friday the 8th

Place: Westfield Hornsby

Details: The car owner has parked his car a Holden Jackaroo in the car park of Westfield and has gone to watch a movie. Just before midnight the owner has returned to his car and noticed his front passenger window smashed and a fire hose poking through the window, the hose was turned on partially filling the car with water. Police and security were called with investigations to continue into the matter.
